The new season is now in full swing, keep checking for early signs of congestion and don't forget to put on those supers when necessary.

Past Event:

Thursday 9th March 2017 Alien Invaders – Small Hive Beetle and The Asian Hornet

Around 20 members turn out to listen to Kay Wreford talk about, first, the Small Hive Beetle and secondly the Asian Hornet. Surprisingly she thought that the beetle posed the greater threat. Having described the main features of the little critter and its life cycle she put up some slides of the absolute devastation that this pest can create in a honeybee hive. They will eat or destroy anything on the comb and leave a stinking mess that smells like rotting oranges.

She then spoke of the problems in Italy and how the authorities have responded. They worked hard to contain the initial outbreak only to find another the following spring. The saddest fact was that following a period without a second appearance when it did reoccur it was discovered that the situation had been created by a non-licenced beekeeper, illegally moving bees out of the exclusion zone! In Italy it is the law that all beekeepers are registered.

The control measures for Small Hive Beetle in Italy are draconian and involve burning every hive in the affected apiary, spraying insecticide on the ground surrounding the hives and ploughing it up. A 13K radius exclusion zone is set up within which no bees or hive products may be moved.

Kay then went on to talk about The Asian Hornet. She described its characteristics, life cycle and feeding habits and how the hawking habit of this hornet when stalking honeybees affects the colony. You need very strong healthy colonies to resist a determined attack by this pest. The one positive issue raised was the fact that all of the hornets found across Europe have the same parentage. This means that their gene pool must be very limited and this gives cause for hope that in the future they may succumb to the many problems associated with inbreeding.

Finally Kay talked about how we should all monitor for each of these pests using our own observations, using traps and by making sure that all of our colonies are registered on 'BeeBase' with up to date information.

This is a subject that I am sure will be visited time and again in the future and we thank Kay for her time and presentation on this occasion.

Kimber's Corner:



Now spring seems to have finally arrived its just great to watch my bees flying every day. They are collecting pollen like crazy and this is a good sign that all is well. It has just amazed me how well they have survived, through the cold winter and having an open mesh floor as well! Having checked my hive weight constantly I noticed it's getting lighter by the week and at my last weekly weighing the hive was 6Kg lighter than when I started in September.

I have been feeding fondant for a couple of months now, March, so I have been informed, is supposed to be the problem month when bees can easily run out of food and starve, even though there appears to be an abundance of available food. Although the bees are still taking the fondant I am increasingly thinking that they need something more syrupy to encourage the queen to lay more brood. But I worry that if the weather changes for the worst over the next few weeks then the bees will not be able to get out and vent.

I couldn't resist a little peek under the crown board to see if everything is OK, however, I could only see some stores and some empty frames at the edges. On the positive side they did look very healthy and were very quiet and didn't mind my intrusion at all.

So I replaced the crown board and added some syrup in a feeder and what do you know, they loved it! I will need to keep monitoring both the feed and the weather and try not to worry too much! Hopefully I will be able to do a full inspection soon, now that the warmer days seem to be here at last.

Good luck with your first inspection if you haven't done one already and hope every things is all good, speak to you all next month.
