Past Events:

29th April 2017 A practical session with Tony and Mark

This was a well-attended session, with 26 members including 6 new beekeepers and 2 juniors, one of whom was only 6 years old!



Everyone put on their bee suits and went across to the hives. The purpose of the session was to locate frames containing drone bees. Members could then practice picking up the drones by their wings, transferring them to the other hand and holding their legs, using thumb and forefinger. This is a good way to practice, avoiding stings from a worker and not putting a queen in danger of being squashed! Several people commented after holding the drones on how much vibration they could feel. Everyone then marked the thorax of the bees with paint using a grass stem.

After a break for tea Mark and Tony showed us how to assemble both brood and super frames. Unfortunately this was interrupted by the persistent attentions of one bee! So Tony had to complete the demonstration with his veil up.

We were also shown how, to set up a hive and frames to accept a swarm, to set up a baithive and how to use swarm lure. This was finished off with some information on the use of contact feeders.

The comments on the session were very favourable. Our thanks go to Mark and Tony for the efforts they put in to help make this a worthwhile exercise.

13th May 2017 Monthly Apiary Open Day

During the previous meeting on the 29th of April it was noted how hives were getting a little congested. This was confirmed when the hives were opened again during this session and it

was considered prudent to act as both hives were showing signs of an intention to swarm.

Each of the apiary beehives are based on a brood and a half National hive under the queen excluder, with a honey super on top.

Jen and Sheila started on hive (1). Elaine was recording notes in the hive log. The roof was removed and placed upside down on the ground then the supers complete with the crown board were placed on top of the roof. The wire frame queen excluder was carefully removed checking that the Queen was not on the underside.

A frame rest was used to hold one of the brood frames, to give more room for manipulations. The contents of the frames, including queen cells, stores, brood, eggs, and pollen was recorded in the hive log.

This process was repeated for both top and bottom brood boxes. Hive 1 was then reassembled and the inspection continued in the same vein on Hive 2.

After a break for refreshments while Sheila and Jen considered how to proceed. A used brood box and super was scorched with a blowtorch and several frames of foundation were made available.

Hive (2) was left to it's own devices and will be checked for queen cells at the next inspection.

The decision was made to create a new brood and a half hive (Number 3) and two nucleus boxes. The two honey supers were split between the Hives (1) and (3).

The marked queen from hive (1) was put into hive (3) on a frame of brood. A frame of stores were also added to Hive (3) and a clean queen excluder and honey super were placed on the top. Followed by a crown board and roof.

A queen cell was selected in Hive (1) and any other frames containing queen cells were removed. New brood frames of foundation were added and the queen excluder, honey super, crown board and roof fitted together.

A brood frame with a charged queen cell and a frame with stores were placed in each of the two nucleus hives. Bees were then shaken into the nucleus boxes and new frames of foundation were added to each one.

So, this was a very busy day in the apiary and covered a whole range of issues. This does highlight the necessity of regular inspections and the work that this can sometimes involve. But it should never be put off.

Thanks to Elaine, Jen and Sheila for making this, such a worthwhile experience.

Date and Honey Tea Loaf Recipe for Kent show in 2017. Ingredients : 170g/6oz plain flour, 30g/1oz margarine, 30g/1oz sugar, 90g/3oz dates, 1/2 level teasp. bicarbonate of soda, 5 tablesp. boiling water, 6 level tablesp. honey, 1 egg. Preparation : Chop the dates, pour boiling water over them and leave to cool. Grease a IIb loaf tin . Rub the margarine into the flour. Dissolve the bicarbonate of soda in the date mixture. Make a well in the centre of the flour mixture, add all the other ingredients and mix well. Pour into the tin and bake at 180 deg. C/350 deg. F/gas mark 4 for approx. 40–50 minutes. Hi Everyone.

As mentioned in my last column things are getting interesting as swarming is now the buzz-word sorry about that, couldn't resist it.

During my last two inspections I noticed a few queen cups and now queen cells are appearing. Happily, so far they have not been occupied. But it is now time to think about swarm control and maybe increase my stock at the same time. It would be great to go into next winter with a second hive, as there is no back up with just one.

At my last inspection I found all frames were covered with bees and the space for the queen to lay was reducing quite quickly. I added a super only a few weeks ago and it has filled up rapidly. To give the bees more space I added another super a few days ago.

I bought a second hive at the beginning of the year and it is probably now going to be put into use. I will need to find the queen and mark her to start off the process. So I have arranged for an extra pair of more experienced eyes to help me! It will also be good having someone in attendance, able to reassure me when I try to perform an Artificial Swarm for the first time!

However, during my hive inspection I noticed there were a lot less bees in the hive and several capped queen cells. They had swarmed! I should have acted sooner!

So a change of plan was needed. With no queen in residence I took down all the queen cells leaving two nice looking ones and marked the frame with a drawing pin. I then reassembled the hive and will now have to wait for seven days to see if the queen emerges from one of the cells. Then I'll need to wait until she mates and comes back into lay. Fingers crossed! I am finding that you sometimes need a lot of patience in this hobby. But hay ho, on the up side I noticed that one of my supers is looking quite spectacular. Should get some honey soon!

I'll let you know how I get on next month.
