Past Events: Thursday 24th May 2018 Outdoor Meeting – Bob Smith's apiary



This was our first attempt at a mid-week evening meeting. We met at 5pm and it was a worthwhile experience as 14 members turned out on a fine spring evening.

The apiary is situated in a glade on the edge of Berry Court Wood in Chattenden. Michel Ryan owns the land and Bob Smith has 2 colonies there, both housed in WBCs. They are both on 14" X 12" deep frames and he is running them as a double brood. This is not a method for the less tall as there

could be some very high colonies by the end of the season! The bees were very well tempered as Bob did his demonstration. Michel is also keeping bees here with Anthony Makowski. They have 2 new colonies, which had been on site for a week, however the bees seemed to like their new surroundings and were building up nicely. Michel opened his bees and with Bob described what was going on in each colony. We all had a slightly different but thoroughly enjoyable time. Our thanks go to Bob and Michel for allowing us to visit this lovely site.

Saturday 16th June 2018 Outdoor Meeting John and Roma Potter's Apiary



Spectacular views of the Kent Weald and a big sky greeted the small group of members who attended John's apiary 'Wayside', at the top of Hunton Hill, Coxheath. The elevated site always brings breezes and the first challenge of the day was to find somewhere that the kettle could be boiled!

Iron Age earthworks are recorded at Wayside; our history starts about 40 years ago with construction beginning on what would become Wayside Light Railway. The beautifully established gardens show the results of a practised hand over many years.

The site straddles Amesbury Road; the tracks are on one side and on the other are woodland and a wildflower meadow, which was created between 2015-17. These habitats undergo maintenance level management to encourage wildlife and flora that include badgers, bats, solitary bees and bluebells. In its' first year, the meadow hosted a stunning array of wildflowers and many varieties of birds utilised the boxes provided in the woodland.

The apiary comprises three hives, which are now in their second season. They occupy a site at the edge of the woodland, fronted by a bank of brambles and backed by trees to mitigate those breezes.

They are mounted on pole stands to defeat predation by wildlife and to prevent a build up of drifting autumn leaves in the entrances. The adjacent meadow, surrounding orchards and hedgerows, as well as the gardens of Coxheath offer a wide range of forage over a long period of time. Incoming pollen has been seen to span the colour range.

All three hives were opened during the inspection. The smaller, weaker colony; a swarm collected from a nearby owl box, only contained a handful of bees. Plenty of eggs, larvae and brood were found on 3-4 frames. 2 sealed brood frames were introduced from a stronger hive to give them a leg up. However the queen remained elusive.

One of the larger hives contained 2 supers well on the way to being filled. They were on brood and a half, only the top half was inspected. All was found to be well with only a few drone cells and no queen cells seen.

The third hive had supers, which were ready for extraction. The same healthy picture was detected here with, as in the last hive, no queen making her appearance in the brood and a half. Varroa also seemed to be at bay in all hives.

The experience level of the members present spanned keen, proficient beginners, to those with decades of beekeeping experience. We had an enjoyable few hours in a beautiful spot with copious tea and homemade cake to follow.

Our thanks must be given, to Mr and Mrs Martin for kindly allowing the visit and extending their hospitality to those members who attended and assisted with the inspections.

An Education Update:

Our 2018 beginner's course — "An Introduction to Beekeeping" finished on 5th June with 24 beekeepers and potential beekeepers completing the course. Further support in the form of mentors and email/telephone advice are being provided; this is an invaluable resource for new beekeepers and we hope further members may come forward to help in future years. Those first years are crucial — please help if you can.

I need to thank the whole of the education team – particularly Jen and Mark for teaching support, Tony for arranging the on-going mentoring and to Sheila for managing the essential admin. We need to review the course materials but essentially we have a framework for 2019 and several members who are able to deliver it – future-proofing!

During May and June we also ran preparatory sessions for the **BBKA Basic Assessment** and 8 members undertook the assessment; we await their results.

Preliminary work is being done on the 2018-19 Winter Studies, which will cover all aspects of the BBKA Module 2 syllabus – Honey Bee Products and Forage. Anyone who might be interested to join this study group should let one of the education team know; provisionally

the 10 sessions will be on alternate Monday evenings starting on 22nd October, with a break over Christmas and the New Year. We will tackle the whole of the Module 2 Syllabus (available to view from the BBKA website). There is however no requirement to sit the examination, just a desire to know more about honey, pollen and foraging; for those who would like to take the exam, we will be finished in time for the examination date of 23rd March.

6th-9th September 2018 The Bee Improvement and Bee Breeders Association (BIBBA) Conference

Venue: The Royal Agricultural University, Cirencester, Gloucestershire

BIBBA will be holding it's conference on the date shown above, all beekeepers are welcome. The programme contains a wide variety of topics, with three simultaneous lectures, together with seminars and workshops. There is something for everyone, whatever their interest or experience. The three lecture streams are themed as follows:

- "Bee Improvement": Queen rearing, bee breeding, genetics, queen mating, mininucs and their management, overwintering queens, etc.
- "General beekeeping": Management techniques, treatment free beekeeping, overwintering nucs, comb honey, marketing, bee communication, etc.
- "Beginner and beyond": Forage and feeding, wintering, swarming, bee space, nutrition, mystery of mating, colony cycle, simple management techniques, colony health, etc.

There are over 50 presentations from more than 30 top presenters, many having over 30 years beekeeping experience, some well over 50, so they are telling participants what the bees have told them, not something straight out of books. Of particular interest to the newer beekeeper is stream 3, above. The whole three days in this stream will be at a level that can help you understand and care for your bees.

There are a variety of scientific and practical topics and this conference is about as good as you will get. You can attend on whichever days you wish and choose the presentation you want. There is also accommodation onsite as well as plenty in the locality. Check the programme, tell your local beekeeping friends and why not fill a car for an enjoyable break? In line with good hygiene practice members are requested not to bring their own hive tools or smokers into the Apiary. They should ensure that their bee suites are regularly laundered and clean and wellington boots are clean. Clean gloves should also be worn.

There will be a boot wash container in the apiary to clean wellingtons.

The following equipment, for use only in the Apiary, is in the large shed in the Apiary: A Smoker / fuel / a gas torch / 2 hive tools in soda solution.

Please clean hive tools and gloves between inspections.
